The grantee voluntarily relinquished this grant, as the project this grant was attached to was no longer financially viable. The Collaborative Applicant received notice of the grantee's decision to do so on October 22, 2014. Due to the short amount of time in which to make a plan for these funds, and to ensure they remained within the Continuum, it was decided to reallocate these funds to RRH. Given the small dollar amount of this grant (\$95,507) the Collaborative Applicant analyzed various options, and determined that the most effective use of these funds was to include them in the new RRH for families project being developed from another grant being eliminated (as described elsewhere in Section 3: Grants Eliminated).
